Urgent Legislative Action: D&R Canal Commission

The D&R Canal Commission was established at the same time as the state park to oversee park planning and regulate use of the parkland. Recent proposals at the state level have advocated abolishing or reducing the authority of this regulatory body, which would have an impact on how the park is cared for and preserved for light recreation and educational uses. Please contact your state representatives and urge them to preserve the canal commission in its current form. Note that tax dollars do not fund the commission, it is financed through fees charged to developers.

SEVENTH ANNUAL MARY TANNER LECTURE

Historian Maxine Lurie and the cartographer Michael Siegel discussed their work on the first atlas of New Jersey in 100 years on Sunday, October 10 at Rider University. Lurie and Siegel were editors of *Mapping New Jersey: An Evolving Landscape*, which includes authoritative texts by 33 contributing scholars and 195 maps, satellite images, graphs and illustrations. The book has been called "a treasure trove of information about our most densely populated state, encompassing the 400 years from Colonial times to the present."

Lurie is Chairman of the Department of History at Rutgers University, co-editor of *New Jersey Encyclopedia*, and recipient of the Richard J. Hughes Award for scholarship and service, from New Jersey Historical Commission.

Siegel is Staff Cartographer in the Geography Department at Rutgers University. He has created maps for many of the books by his Rutgers colleagues. He says that maps have the "power to explain complex information in a picture."

The Mary Tanner Lecture honors one of the founders of the Lawrence Historical Society, the first woman to serve on the Lawrence Town Council, and a passionate lover of American history for all of her more than ninety years.

BREARLEY FAMILY CHAIR

At last, the beautiful 1761 Brearley House has a piece of furniture that belonged to the family. At the tenth anniversary celebration last May, a magnificent Chippendale-style chair was presented as a long term loan from Mrs. Jean Mahan Koeppel of Pennington. Mrs. Koeppel is a direct descendant of George Brearley, whose father James built the house. The chair, one of twelve, was a wedding gift to Ann Gillingham and George Brearley. The couple had twelve children, and the set of chairs was dispersed among family members over the years.

The chair was made in Philadelphia ca 1780 by the noted cabinet maker Benjamin Randolph. It may now be seen in the museum room upstairs in the Brearley House. The Lawrence Historical Society gratefully thanks the Koeppel family for sharing their treasure with the history-loving community.
